**TABLE I – LENGTH OF THE 2006/07 SCHOOL YEAR  
(PRIMARY AND GENERAL SECONDARY EDUCATION)**

- <sup>2</sup> **BELGIUM GERMAN-SPEAKING COMMUNITY:** The **teachers'** school year is similar to the students' school year but, since 2005/06, the head of institutions may require teachers to be present the last 5 working days of the month of August for certain non-teaching activities (exams, decisions in connection with the student's results, preparation of the new school year, etc.).
- <sup>1</sup> **CZECH REPUBLIC:** The Education Act determines that school year starts 01 September and ends 31 August (of the following calendar year). The school year is divided into a period of school lessons and a period of school holidays. If September falls on Friday or a weekend day, the period of school lessons starts the following Monday.  
According to the Labour Code, the holidays for **teachers** at primary or secondary level is 8 weeks each calendar year. They take it primarily in the time of school holidays.
- <sup>3</sup> **DENMARK:** *Folkeskoler* are at liberty to decide on the number of holidays and their distribution, provided they offer a minimum number of 200 days of lessons during each school year. The Ministry of Education only determines the date of the last day of the school year. This is the case for both primary and general secondary education. 01 August is the earliest possible date to start, schools normally begin 1 or 2 weeks later.
- Teachers:** Beginning 09 August (General secondary education). Both primary and secondary schools are at liberty to decide on the number of holidays and their distribution, provided they live up to offering a minimum of 200 days of lessons during each school year. This also applies to the length of the teachers' school year, which may differ at the single educational institution in question.
- <sup>4</sup> **GERMANY:** In accordance with the *Hamburg Agreement* between the *Länder* on harmonisation in the school system, the school year begins on 01 August and ends on 31 July. The actual beginning and end depend on the dates of the summer holidays which vary from one year to the other.

- <sup>5</sup> **ESTONIA:** The Basic Schools and Upper Secondary Schools Act stipulates that an academic year shall start on 01 September and a study period shall include not less than 175 days of study (35 weeks). School holidays (and accordingly the end of the school year) are determined by a regulation of the Minister of Education for every school year.  
The beginning and the end of a **teacher's** school year depend on the individual school and teacher. According to the legislation, **teachers** have 56 days (8 weeks) of vacation. Generally, they go on vacation in the middle of June and are back in the middle of August.

- 6 **GREECE: Official** school year: 01 September 2006 to 31 August 2007. **Teaching** school year: 01 September 2006 to 21 June 2007.

- 8 **FRANCE:** Certain schools have a 4-day-week. Only in these cases will the dates vary. For students who have no classes on Wednesday, holidays will start after lessons on Tuesday and the beginning of the school year will be on Thursday. **Teachers** have to begin on 01 September 2005.
- 9 **IRELAND:** In accordance with circular M29/95, the minimum number of teaching days per post-primary school year will be 167. In addition, in accordance with circular M21/04, holiday periods during the school year have been standardised, ie midterm breaks, Christmas and Easter holidays. Traditionally, formal instruction ends in post-primary schools on the Friday preceding the June bank holiday weekend. State examinations normally commence the following Wednesday. In order for schools to meet their requirement to be open for 167 days during 2006/07 school year, it is expected that post schools will open circa 29 August 2006.
- 10 **Italy:** Schools can adjust the school calendar, established by the Regions, to the POF's requirements (POF is a basic document of the cultural and planning identity of the schools. It defines the curricular, extra-curricular, educational and organisational projects of each school within the school autonomy). Schools can organize in a

flexible way the overall timetable for the curriculum and for any single subject even on the basis of multi-week planning, provided that lessons spread over a minimum of five days per week and that the prescribed annual, pluriennial or cycle number of hours for the single subjects is complied with. Generally speaking, the school year begins between the 2nd and the 4th week of September and finishes between the 1st and the 3rd week of June. The school adaptations of the organization of school time must guarantee at least 200 days of lesson a school year.

- <sup>11</sup> **CYPRUS:** the 5<sup>th</sup> of June is the end of the students' school year for students in lower secondary education. For the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> grade of upper secondary education the school year ends on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of June. For the 3<sup>rd</sup> grade of upper secondary education the school year ends on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of June. The Minister of Education and Culture may choose to change the above dates for educational benefit reasons. General secondary education: end of school year, end of June (includes exams, correction of papers, result announcements).

The official school year is longer for teachers in both primary and secondary education as it includes registration days, sorting out of schools and classes and exam periods.			
In secondary general education according to the law, the official school year is from 01 September 2006 until the 31 August 2007.			
Teachers, however, need to be at school from the 01 September 2006 until the 30 June 2007 for "school work".			

- <sup>12</sup> **LATVIA:** Primary education (Basic education): end of the school year for the 9<sup>th</sup> class: 08 June 2007. General secondary education: end of the school year for the 12<sup>th</sup> class: 15 June 2007. The school year is divided in two semesters: the first from 01 September to 22 December and the second from 08 January to 31 May (or 08 June for the 9<sup>th</sup> class and 15 June for the 12<sup>th</sup> class). Extension of the school year for classes 1-8 and 10-11 may be made if specific circumstances hindering education process arise during the school year (e.g. coldness, strike, emergency situation in school, etc.).

**Teachers:** The teachers' school year concurs fully with students' year, but normally is longer and starts earlier, though the end and the start date is not defined officially. Teachers have the right to receive 8 weeks of paid annual leave in summer.

- <sup>13</sup> **LITHUANIA:** It is within each school's discretion to decide what kind of activity pupils will be offered from 01 to 21 June: either disciplinary subject-based projects, subject/art weeks, work at the school library, visits to higher education schools, installing exhibition, visits to historic places, sports events, remedial courses for pupils not showing notable progress, etc.

Pupils in the years 1 to 5 can finish only after at least 170 school days, while those in the years 6 to 11 after at least 195 days. These days include the national holidays. Pupils in the last year of upper secondary education finish their lessons on 11 May.

The annual amount of leave for **teachers** is legislated as 56 calendar days. Normally, it is recommended that teachers take their annual leave during school summer holidays (i.e. teachers' leave is normally determined by the school calendar).

- <sup>14</sup> **HUNGARY:** At schools, using any of the ethnic minority languages as the language of instruction at general secondary education, the end of the school year, in case of pupils taking the school leaving examination: 03 May 2007. (Source: Decree N° 4/2006 [II.24.] of the Minister of Education on the school year 2006/07).

- <sup>15</sup> **MALTA:** Primary – 26 to 28 June 2007 annual examinations.

Secondary: 13 to 15 June 2007 oral examinations (annual examinations); 18 to 28 June 2007 annual examinations.

**Teachers:** Beginning 20 September 2006 and ending on 12 July 2007. INSET courses are held on the 15, 18 and 19 September and on the 9, 10 and 11 July 2007.

- <sup>16</sup> **NETHERLANDS:** The school year officially runs from 01 August to 31 July of the following year. Start and end of the teaching year is according to region (north, central and south region).

The **teachers'** school year is similar as students' school year. However, it is at the school's discretion to decide whether **teachers** are expected to end or start later (in order to attend meetings, for preparation of timetable, other non-teaching activities etc.).

- <sup>17</sup> **AUSTRIA:** Other *Länder*: Kärnten, Oberösterreich, Salzburg, Steiermark, Tirol, Vorarlberg.

The **teachers'** school year is of the same length as the pupils' school year.

- <sup>18</sup> **POLAND:** End of the school year in both primary and secondary schools is always the first Friday after the 18<sup>th</sup> of June. In the last grades of upper secondary schools ending with the Matura examination, however, the school year ends earlier, but the date has not yet been decided. In the last grades of gymnasium (lower secondary) ending with the external examination, the school year ends on 27 April 2007. In the last grades of basic vocational schools, ending with the external vocational examination, the school year ends on 15 June 2007.

In general, **teachers'** school year covers the same period of time as pupils' school year. Teachers' holidays, however, may be shortened by max. 7 days, if there is a need to perform organisational tasks in a given school.

- <sup>19</sup> **PORTUGAL:** Student's school year ends on 08 June (for 9<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> years of schooling) and on 22 June (for all the other ones). This happens because the first ones have external exams on some subjects.

**Teachers:** Beginning 1 September and ending 30 August. This is the official length of school year, although the teachers have school summer holidays for a month (they can have summer holidays during the months of June, July or August, according to school needs).

- <sup>20</sup> **SLOVENIA:** The official length of the school year is from 01 September to 31 August, but lessons are completed in June.

**Primary education:** Primary and lower secondary education (single structure education);

**General secondary education:** Upper secondary general education.

**End of the school lessons (single structure of primary and lower secondary education):**

15 June for the final grade pupils, external examinations run by the end of June;

22 June for pupils who are not in the final grade.

**End of the upper secondary school lessons:**

18 May end of lessons for students in final grade; final examinations in June and July;

22 June is the last day of lessons for upper secondary students who are not in the final grade.

**Teachers'** school year begins about 10 days before the pupils'/students' school year and ends some 14-21 days after the end of pupils' lessons. The precise length depends on the individually determined leave of a teacher (from 22 to 35 days) and his/her tasks and obligations allocated by the head teacher.

- <sup>21</sup> **SLOVAKIA:** Official school year: 01 September to 31 August.  
Following the Labour Code, **teachers** and **head teachers** at primary and secondary levels have 8 weeks of holidays per calendar year. They take it during the holidays. Usually, **teachers** work one week after beginning of summer holidays and one week before the beginning of the school.
- <sup>22</sup> **FINLAND:** In the 2006/07 school year, there will be 188 school days in all.
- <sup>23</sup> **SWEDEN:** The exact days vary on regional and municipality levels.  
**Teachers:** There is a total of 178 school days and around 5 extra days when teachers work or undergo training and the students have no classes.
- <sup>24</sup> In **ENGLAND AND WALES**, schools must be open for at least 380 half day sessions each school year. The dates of school terms are not fixed nationally; they are set, depending on the legal category of the school, by the local authority (LA) or school governing body. Although school holidays generally cover the same core periods, exact dates may vary between schools and authorities. In most cases, the school year runs from the first week of September to the third or fourth week of July. There is currently some movement towards the adoption of a standard school year which would be consistent year on year. A number of LAs began to introduce this new model in 2004/05 and other LAs are working towards introduction of a standard school year in subsequent years. However, the decision to adopt the new model remains at the level of the LA or school governing body.  
Length of the **teachers'** school year: Teachers are required to be available for 5 additional days. Schools normally schedule these within the school opening dates given in the table.
- <sup>25</sup> In **NORTHERN IRELAND**, schools must be open for 190 days a year. The dates of school terms are not fixed nationally; they are set, depending on the legal category of the school, by the Education and Library Board (ELB) or school governing body. Therefore school holidays may differ between boards and schools. The five ELBs, encouraged by the Department of Education, have set up a harmonisation scheme, which sets the core holiday dates on which no services (school transport and school meals) are provided. Schools do not have to set holidays within these dates, but they are strongly advised to do so. In addition, for the 2006/07 school year, schools may allocate up to five 'School Development Days' from within the 190 days. These five days are devoted to staff development and school improvement; the school is closed to pupils.  
Length of **teachers'** school year: Teachers are required to be available for 5 additional days. These are scheduled by schools to take place outside but near to the dates given in the table.
- <sup>26</sup> In **SCOTLAND**, pupils attend school for 190 days a year.  
There are no differences between primary and secondary schools, however, there are variances across the 32 local education authorities.  
**The earliest start date** for the school year 2006/07 is 14 August 2006.  
The **teachers'** school year is longer by 5 in-service days, thus it is 195 days long.
- <sup>27</sup> In **ICELAND:** There are still a few small rural schools at compulsory level which operate for 8 ½ months.  
**Teachers** work for 9 months. According to their wage contract, teachers in primary and lower secondary education must work 8 days at school during the months of June to August and teachers in upper secondary education attend school 4 days, before and after the school year commences.

- <sup>28</sup> **NORWAY:** The **teachers'** work during the year is counted in working hours, that is 1300 hours for primary education (ISCED 1), 1225 hours for lower secondary education (ISCED 2) and 1150 for upper secondary education (ISCED 3). It is an individual matter for each school if the work hours, longer than for students, are before the beginning or after the end.
- <sup>29</sup> **BULGARIA:** \*\*Pupils from VIII grade for whom the school year will close on 30 June (primary education) are those admitted to continue their compulsory education in VIII grade, after completing successfully VII grade, to secondary language learning schools, after undergoing national tests or alternative form of examinations.  
**Teachers:** The decision on the length of the teachers' school year is not taken at central level. Each educational institution (the school director) is entitled to draw up the school working schedule for the employed teachers. Most common situation is that the teachers are supposed to be at disposal at school in the beginning of September in order to get prepared with the necessary school documentation etc. As for the end of a given school year, it again depends on whether the teachers are needed at school in order to help/complete/close with the school documentation or whether they are involved in certain initiated projects, initiatives, etc.
- <sup>30</sup> **ROMANIA:** Beginning of the school year: In exceptional situations, depending on local climatic conditions and school's specificity, the structure of the school year can be modified at the request of schools approved by the local educational authorities (County School Inspectorates). Approval is given if the number of 35 weeks and 174 school days is maintained and all pupils may participate, without restrictions in national examinations.

For the 8<sup>th</sup> grade, the length of the school year corresponds to 34 weeks and 169 days, starting on 15 September and ending on 8 June.

**Teachers:** Beginning 01 September, ending 31 August. During school holidays, teachers may benefit from an annual leave of minimum 62 days, excluding Sundays and legal holidays.

<sup>31</sup> **TURKEY:** For primary and general secondary education, a school year must be not less than 180 days. A school year runs 9 months from September to June.

The length of the **teachers'** school year for primary and general secondary education is from 01 September 2006 to 01 July 2007.

- <sup>24</sup> In **ENGLAND AND WALES**, schools must be open for at least 380 half day sessions each school year. The dates of school terms are not fixed nationally; they are set, depending on the legal category of the school, by the local authority (LA) or school governing body. Although school holidays generally cover the same core periods, exact dates may vary between schools and authorities. In most cases, the school year runs from the first week of September to the third or fourth week of July. There is currently some movement towards the adoption of a standard school year which would be consistent year on year. A number of LAs began to introduce this new model in 2004/05 and other LAs are working towards introduction of a standard school year in subsequent years. However, the decision to adopt the new model remains at the level of the LA or school governing body.  
Length of the **teachers'** school year: Teachers are required to be available for 5 additional days. Schools normally schedule these within the school opening dates given in the table.
- <sup>25</sup> In **NORTHERN IRELAND**, schools must be open for 190 days a year. The dates of school terms are not fixed nationally; they are set, depending on the legal category of the school, by the Education and Library Board (ELB) or school governing body. Therefore school holidays may differ between boards and schools. In accordance with circular M29/95, the minimum number of teaching days per post-primary school year will be 167. In addition, in accordance with circular M21/04, holiday periods during the school year have been standardised, ie midterm breaks, Christmas and Easter holidays. Traditionally, formal instruction ends in post-primary schools on the Friday preceding the June bank holiday weekend. State examinations normally commence the following Wednesday. In order for schools to meet their requirement to be open for 167 days during 2006/07 school year, it is expected that post schools will open circa 29 August 2006.

The above holidays are standardised in accordance with circular M21/04. The school year at post-primary level is very tight and doesn't allow for any additional holidays as schools must comply with the minimum number of 167 days. In fact, in recent years, since the standardised school calendar, many schools who would have traditionally opened on 1 September are now opening in late August in order to meet their full complement of days. There is more flexibility at primary school level as they are not restricted by end of year state exams.

Schools can adjust the school calendar, established by the Regions, to the POF's requirements (POF is a basic document of the cultural and planning identity of the schools. It defines the curricular, extra-curricular, educational and organisational projects of each school within the school autonomy). Schools can organize in a flexible way the overall timetable for the curriculum and for any single subject even on the basis of multi-week planning, provided that lessons spread over a minimum of five days per week and that the prescribed annual, pluriennial or cycle number of hours for the single subjects is complied with. The school adaptations of the organization of school time must guarantee at least 200 days of lesson a school year.

Approval is given if the number of 35 weeks and 174 school days is maintained and all pupils may participate, without restrictions in national examinations.

For the 8<sup>th</sup> grade, the length of the school year corresponds to 34 weeks and 169 days, starting on 15 September and ending on 8 June.

For primary and general secondary education, a school year must be not less than 180 days. A school year runs 9 months from September to June.

A school year is divided into two parts: at the end of a semester, there is a two-weeks' holiday called mid-school year holiday. The summer holidays are between June and September. Decisions on ending/starting semester dates are made by the Ministry.
